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Dear members, colleagues, partners, and friends,

The Philippine Plan of Action to End Violence Against Children (PPAEVAC) has been launched! We now have the map to achieve Sustainable Development Goal 16.2 which is to eliminate all forms of violence against children. The PPAeVAC has 6 key result areas and a focal government agency is tasked to lead each one with support coming from other stakeholders. The Child Protection Network Foundation (CPN) has an important role in all the 6 key result areas. CPN's work in the last 20 years has prepared it for exactly this moment.

The care continuum for abused children spans from prevention to intervention. CPN's work started with the response to children who have been abused; providing the essential medical, psychosocial, and legal services to stop abuse and prevent its recurrence. Scaling up from one Child Protection Unit at the Philippine General Hospital to the present 94 Women and Children Protection Units (WCPUs) in 50 provinces and 10 independent cities took 15 years. There were many lessons learned along the way. Intervention has to be multidisciplinary and the personnel involved have to be well-trained. Just one sector cannot crack it. The whole system has to be functional. Violence against children is a socio-ecological phenomenon in which inter-personal violence is situated within a number of larger contextual factors that influence individual behaviors. Therefore, intervention should also follow the socio-ecological approach; from the individual to the family, peers, and community including social norms, culture, and laws of society at large. CPN's work has evolved around this. We do not have to re-invent the wheel. There are evidence-based programs that have been shown to work that can be adapted to our setting. Collaboration is a win-win situation. We have remained agile through the years and have responded well to challenges and opportunities. Research is opening new doors for us.

Congratulations to the Department of Health (DOH), our most valuable partner for 2017! The DOH has been our partner for the past 20 years in the establishment of WCPUs across the country. The passage of the DOH Administrative Order 2013-0011 on the establishment of WCPUs in all government hospitals has served as a stimulus for exponential growth. The inclusion of women and child protection in the curriculum of the residency training programs of Obstetrics and Gynecology last year and Pediatrics this year has further strengthened the health response to sexual abuse of children and adolescents and child maltreatment as a whole. It has been a year on setting the direction for the years ahead as we buckle down to end violence against children.

Creation of the Child Protection Unit (CPU) at the Philippine General Hospital – a dedicated emergency room and clinic for abused children.

2002

Establishment of the Child Protection Network (CPN). Six CPUs launched in year one.

2008

Foundation of the Asian Resource Center, a collaborative effort between CPN and the International Society for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect.

2009

Establishment of CPUs in Lahore and Peshawar, Pakistan.

2010

Expansion of the network to 38 CPUs in 25 provinces nationwide.

2011

Recognition of the Women and Child Protection Specialty Training as the required training of Women and Children Protection Unit (WCPU) physicians by the Department of Health (DOH).

2012

Expansion of the network to 62 WCPUs in 7 cities and 35 provinces in the Philippines in partnership with the DOH and various local government units.

2013

Issuance of the DOH of Administrative Order No. 2013-0011: “Revised Policy on the Establishment of WCPU in all Government Hospitals.”

2014

Adoption of Trauma Informed Care (TIC) and Trauma Informed Psychosocial Processing (TIPP) in the Philippines.

Dissemination of the Protocol for Case Management of Child Victims of Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation.

2015

Establishment of the Child Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation (CANE) Study Group at the University of the Philippines Manila - National Institutes of Health.

2016

Integration of Women and Children Protection in the OB-GYN Residency Training Curriculum.

Completion of the Safe Schools for Teens: Preventing Sexual Abuse of Poor Urban Teens Study.

2017

Integration of Instructional Design on Child Protection in the Pediatric Residency Training Curriculum.

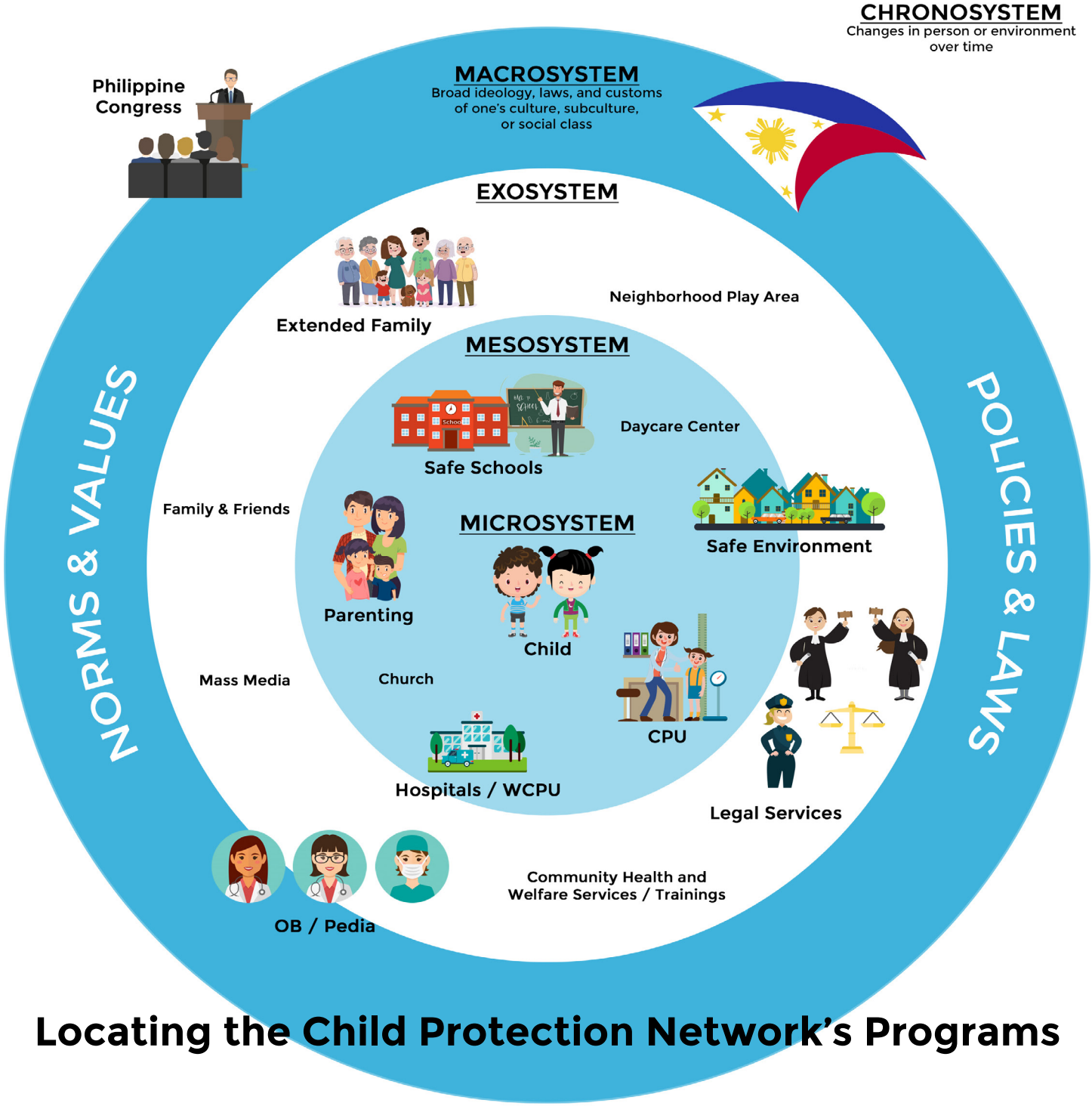

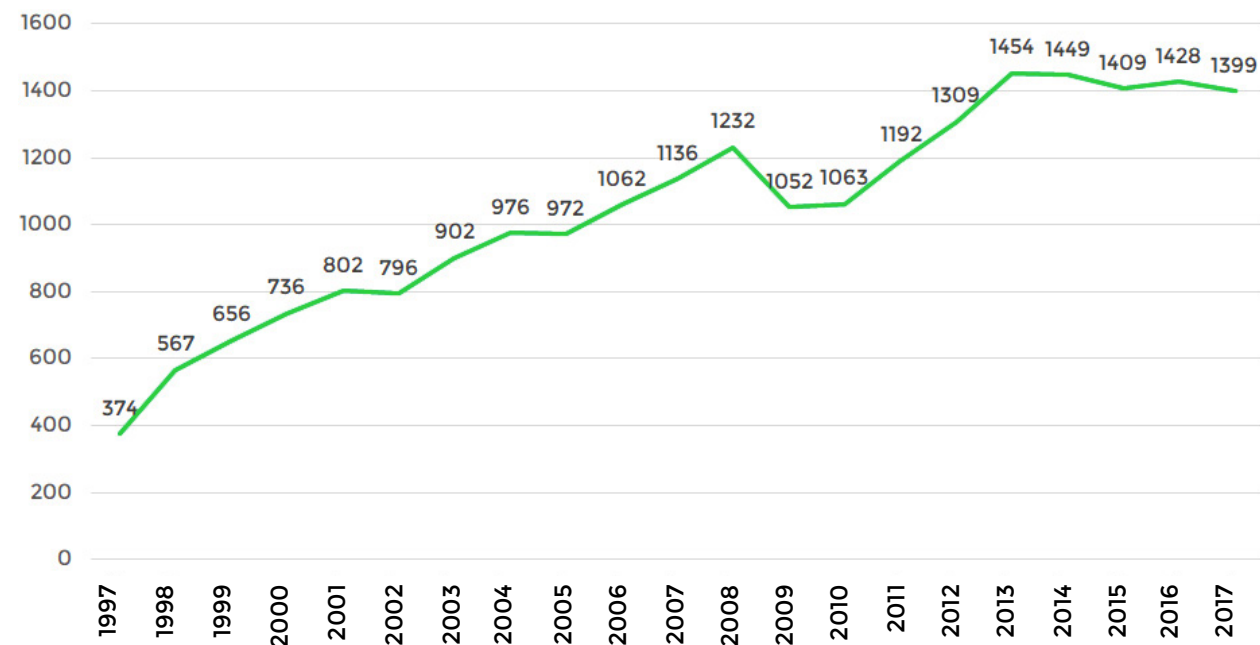

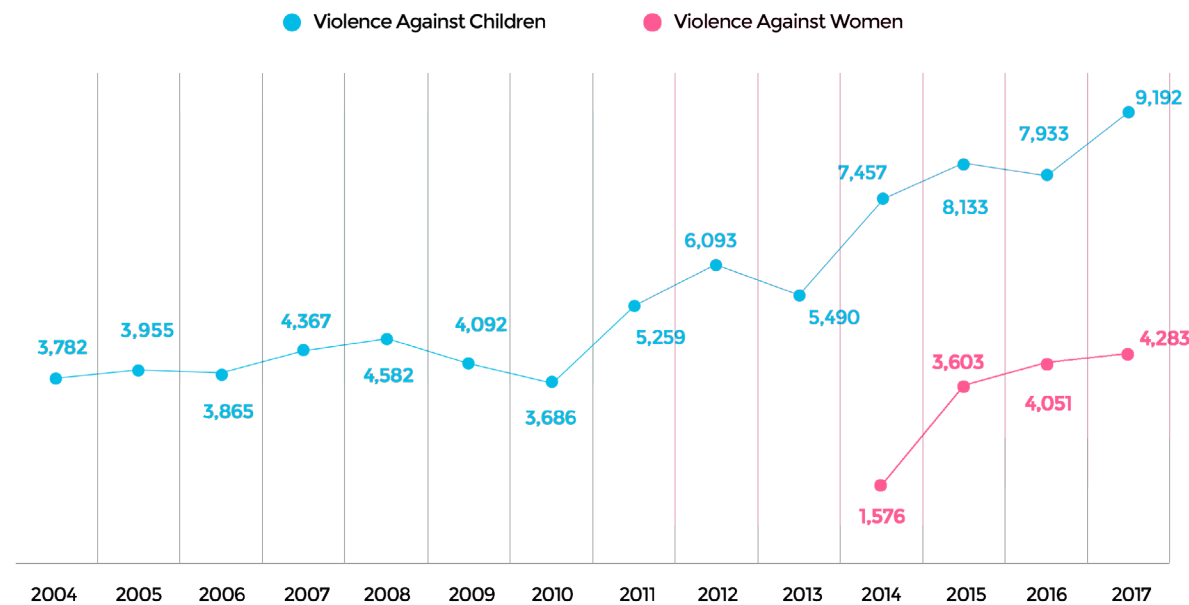

NEW CASES SERVED BY WCPUs EACH YEAR



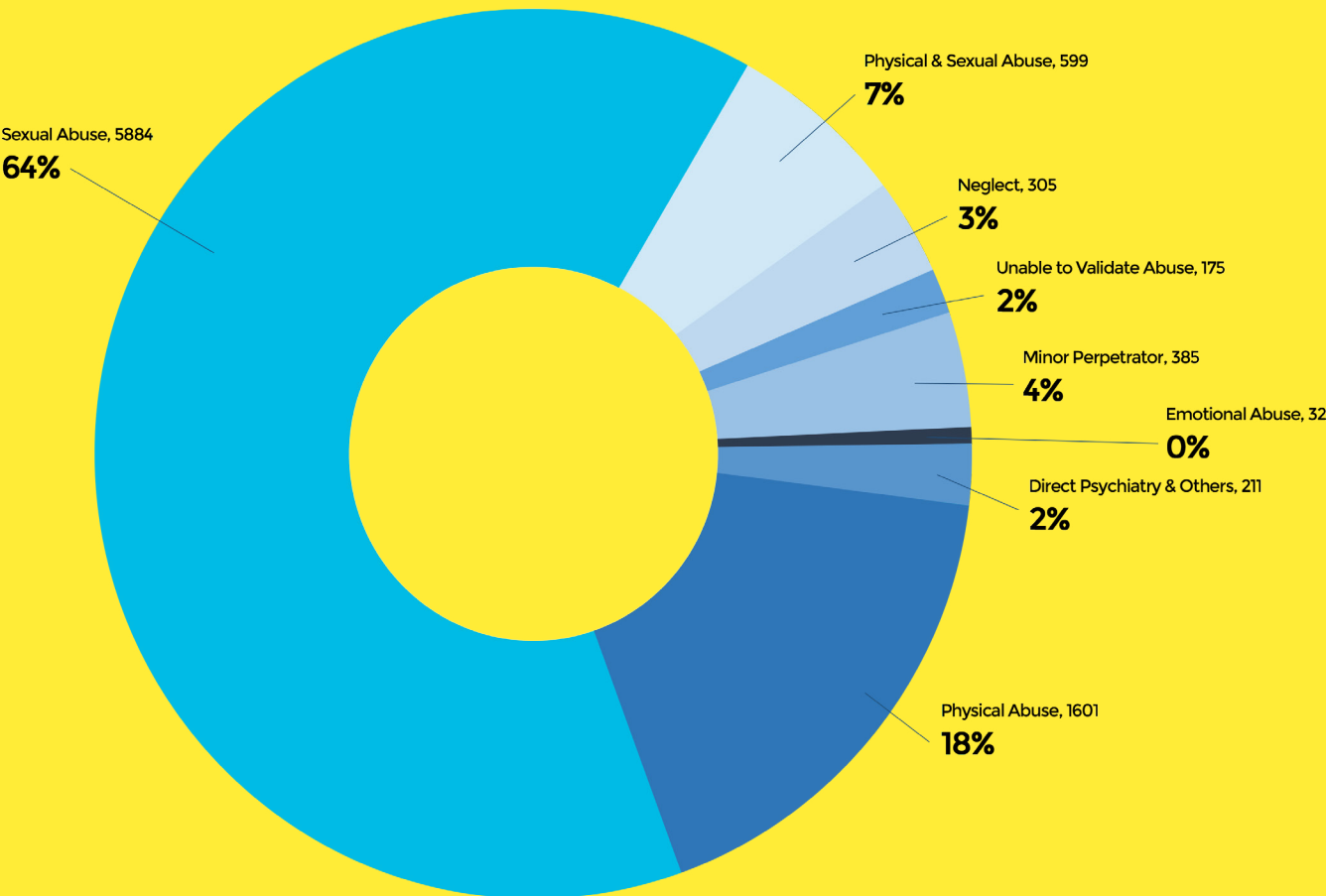
The WCPUs served more than 9,000 cases of violence against children and over 4,000 cases of violence against women in the year 2017. Although there is an increase of over a thousand cases involving children compared to the previous year, it is still important to note the findings of the NBS-VAC (2015) that only 13.5% (12.8% of males and 14.2% of females) ever consulted or used the services of a WCPU.

BREAKDOWN OF VAC CASES BY TYPE OF ABUSE

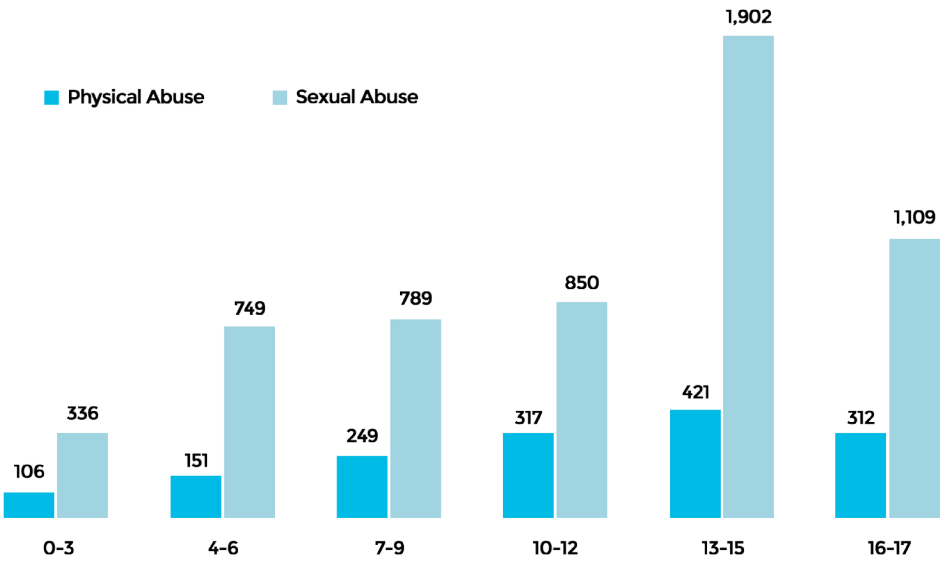


Consistently seen in the WCPUs, sexual abuse cases (64%) are more commonly reported followed by physical abuse cases (18%). The respondents of the NBS-VAC (2015) declared that sexual abuse is indeed more reportable while corporal punishment or physical abuse is widely accepted as a norm by Filipinos. About 66% of the respondents of the study reported experiencing physical violence while 19% experienced sexual violence in childhood. Emotional / Psychological abuse (32 cases) continues to be the least recognized and reported to the WCPUs even though the NBS-VAC (2015) showed otherwise with 3 out of 5 children experiencing psychological violence.

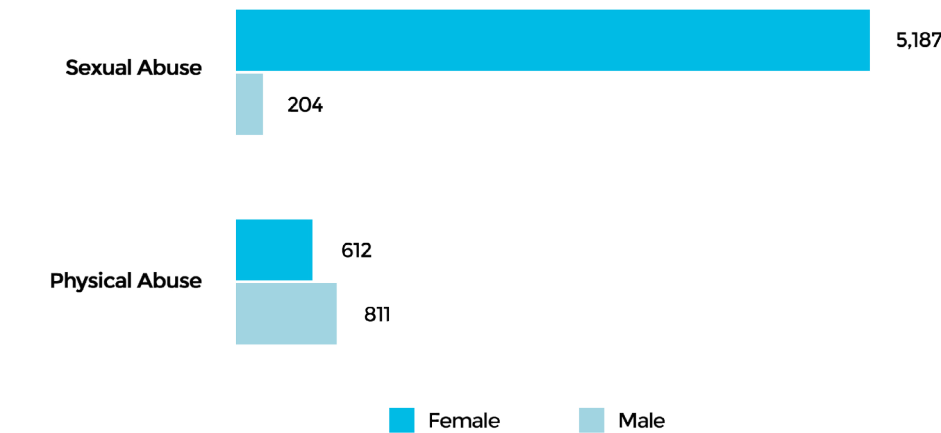

Sexually abused children seen in the WCPUs are typically teenagers 13-15 years old. The next high-risk age group for sexual abuse is 16-17 years old. Children in the middle adolescence are commonly impulsive and vulnerable to peer pressure. The NBS-VAC (2015) also supports the WCPU data that sexual violence most often takes place during dating of the 13-15 age group.

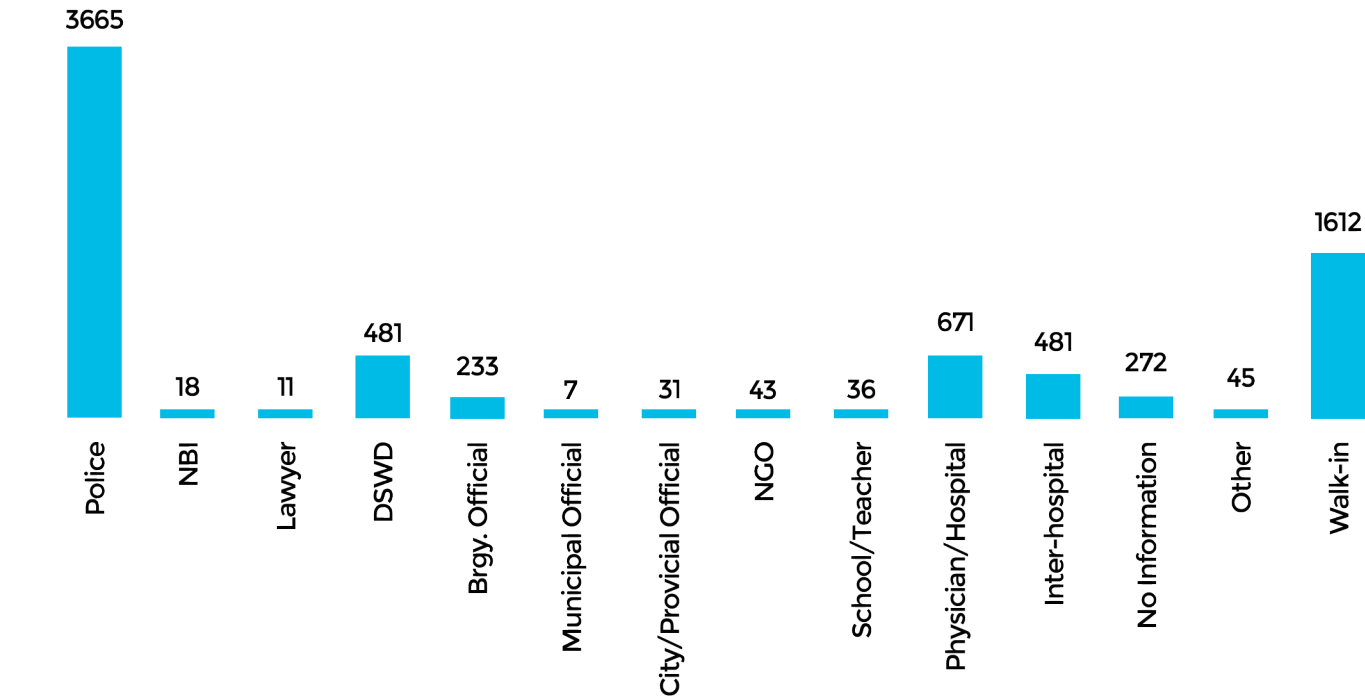
BREAKDOWN OF VAC PHYSICAL AND SEXUAL ABUSE CASES BY GENDER



In the WCPUs, girl-children seeking services for sexual abuse far outnumber boy-children. However, we know from the NBS-VAC (2015) that males were more likely than females to experience sexual violence at home, in school, and in other settings, such as community, workplace, and even dating. The fact that sexual violence among boys are underreported remains.

SOURCES OF REFERRALS AND NUMBER OF REFERRED VAC CASES



Majority of the VAC cases referred to the WCPUs are from the police followed by walk-ins or self-referred cases. Referrals from school/teacher increased more than half compared to last year's data. The role of the school in child protection is very important because among children who sought help from authorities, the largest proportion reached out to teachers and guidance counselors (NBS-VAC, 2015). Age-appropriate life skills and personal safety lessons integrated in the school curricula, such as the Safe Schools for Teens project, is a key strategy in developing children's skills in protecting themselves from violence (see page 28).

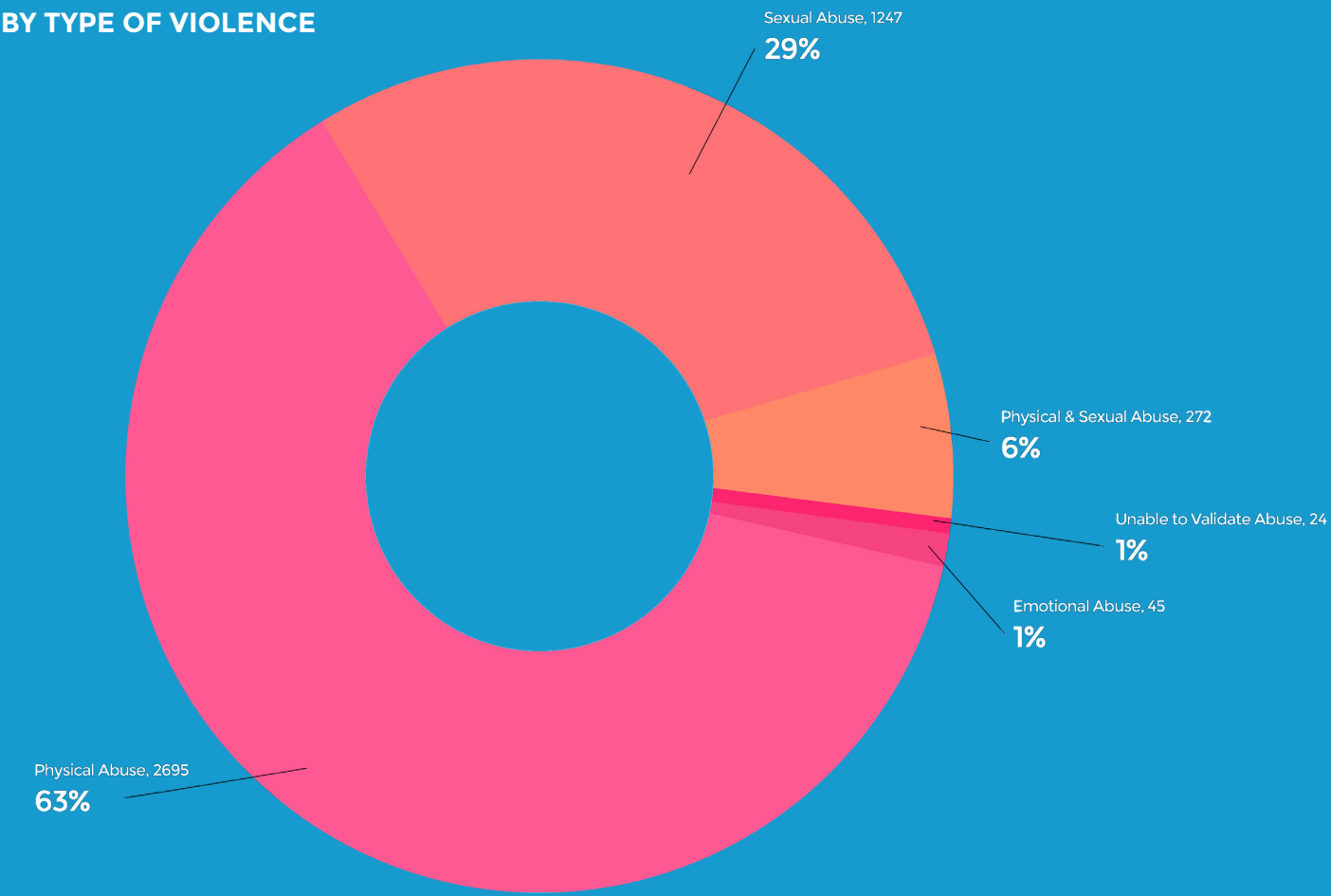
Physical violence occurs in the form of violent discipline and non-disciplinary contexts. Corporal punishment or physical abuse is widely used and accepted as a norm by Filipinos (SLR, 2016). The top three perpetrators of child physical abuse are fathers, neighbors, and strangers. Evidence-based and culturally-appropriate parenting interventions, such as the Masayang Pamilya Para Sa Batang Pilipino Parenting Program, is a key strategy to improve knowledge and skills of parents in providing proper care and protection (see page 26).

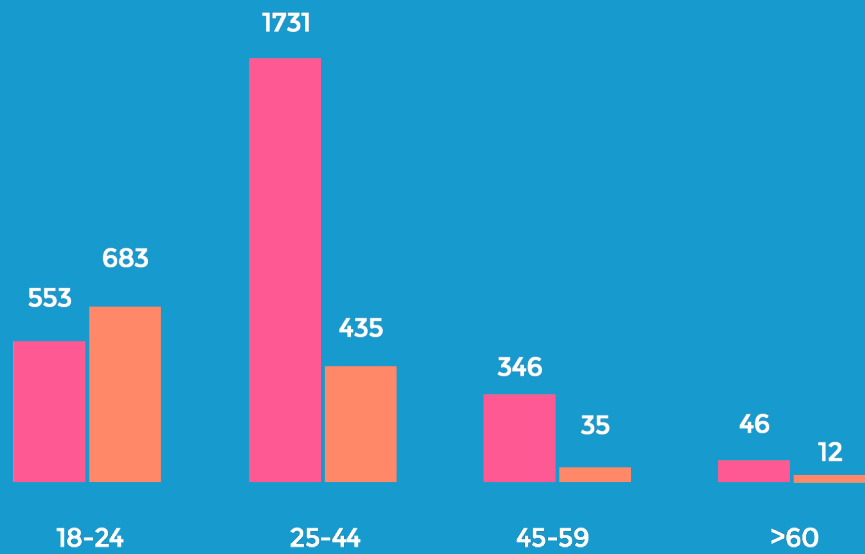
The data of the WCPUs validate the results of the NBS-VAC (2015) that sexual violence against children most often occurs at home, in the community, and during dating. Neighbors are still the most common perpetrators of sexual violence against children followed by boyfriends.

BREAKDOWN OF VAW CASES BY TYPE OF VIOLENCE



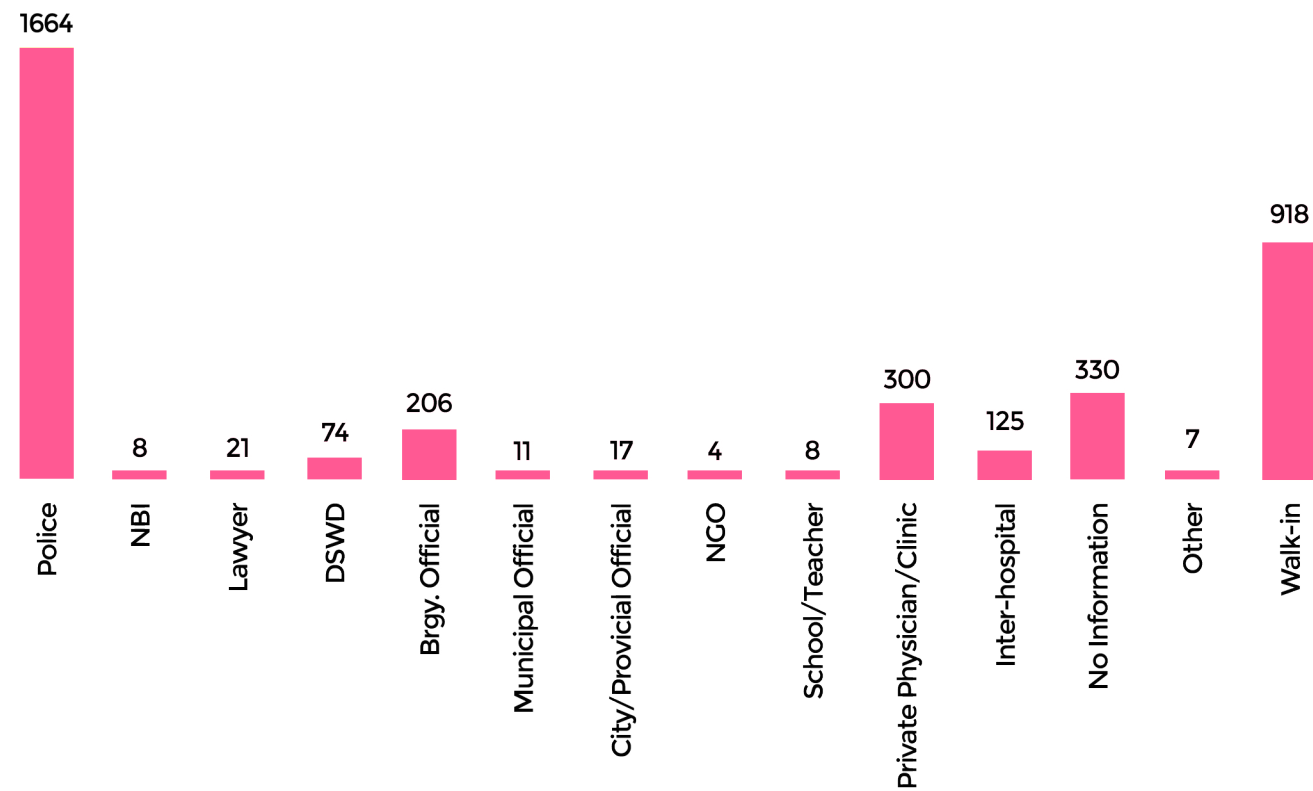

Parents and caregivers are aware of and practicing evidence-based parenting skills and positive discipline towards building a safe, nurturing, and protective environment.

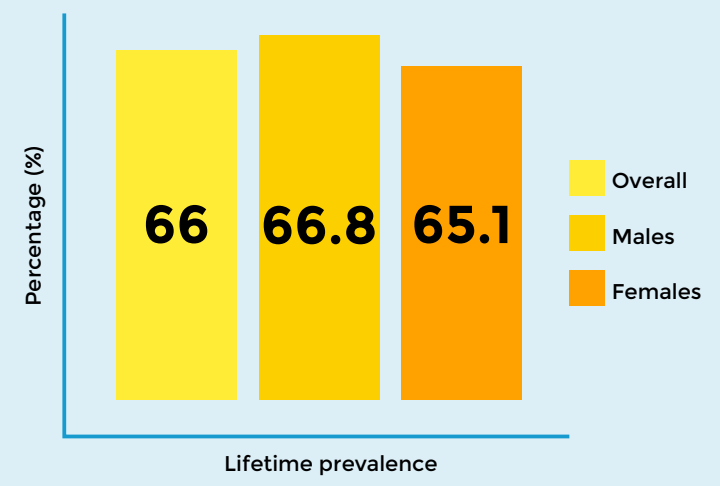


Figure 1. Prevalence of physical violence among children in the Philippines, as reported by 13-17 year olds

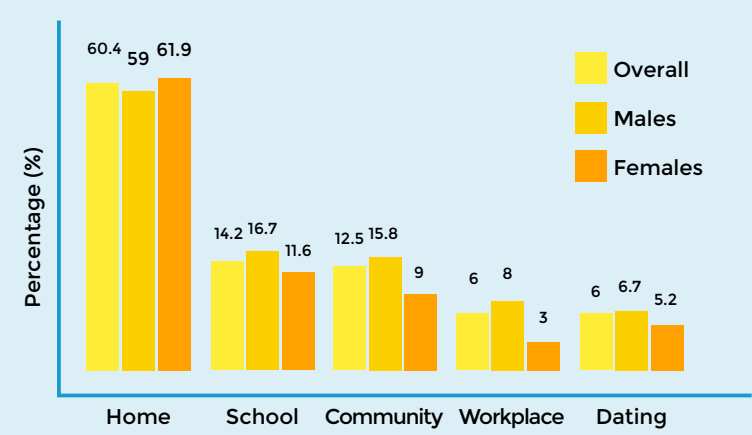


Figure 2. Prevalence of physical violence among children in the Philippines, by setting, as reported by 13-17 year olds

The National Baseline Study on Violence Against Children (NBS-VAC) in the Philippines showed that **3 out of 5 Filipino children are physically abused** (see Figure 1) and that **physical abuse occurs primarily at home** (see Figure 2).

KEY STRATEGY

Evidence-based, age-appropriate, and gender-responsive parenting programs to improve parents' and caregivers' knowledge and skills in providing proper care and protection and in using positive discipline

CPN'S CONTRIBUTION

MASAYANG PAMILYA PARA SA BATANG PILIPINO PARENTING PROGRAM

Parenting for Lifelong Health - Philippines also referred to as the Masayang Pamilya Para sa Batang Pilipino Parenting Program is a locally adapted, group-based parenting program for Filipino families with children aged 2 to 6 years old. It was adapted with the permission of the developers and license holders of the Sinovuyo Caring Families Program for Young Children. PLH-Philippines is a collaboration between the Ateneo de Manila University, Philippine Ambulatory Pediatric Association, Child Protection Network Foundation, Cape Town University, Oxford University, Bangor University, UNICEF, and UBS Optimus Foundation. The program was designed specifically for vulnerable families facing challenges with their children's behavior with the goal of promoting positive parenting to reduce the risk of child abuse and neglect in low-income communities. With the core theme: "Pagtataguyod ng Masayang Tahanan", it aims to help parents manage their children's behavior while promoting healthy parent-child relationships.

Children and adolescents demonstrate personal skills in managing risks, protecting themselves from violence, reporting their experience of violence, and seeking professional help when needed.

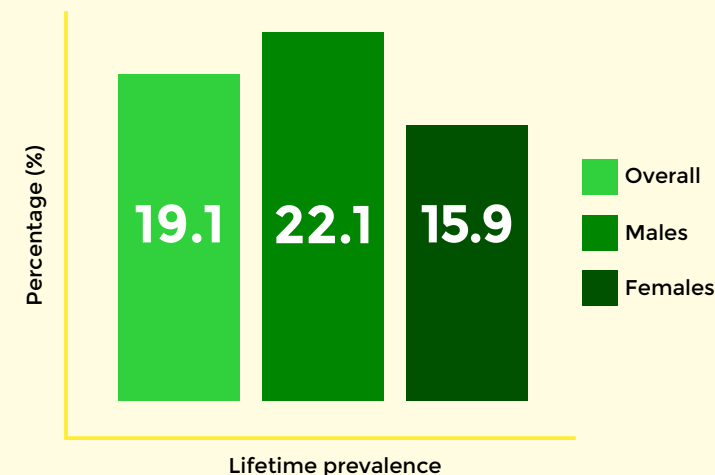


Figure 3. Prevalence of sexual abuse among children in the Philippines, as reported by 13-17 year olds

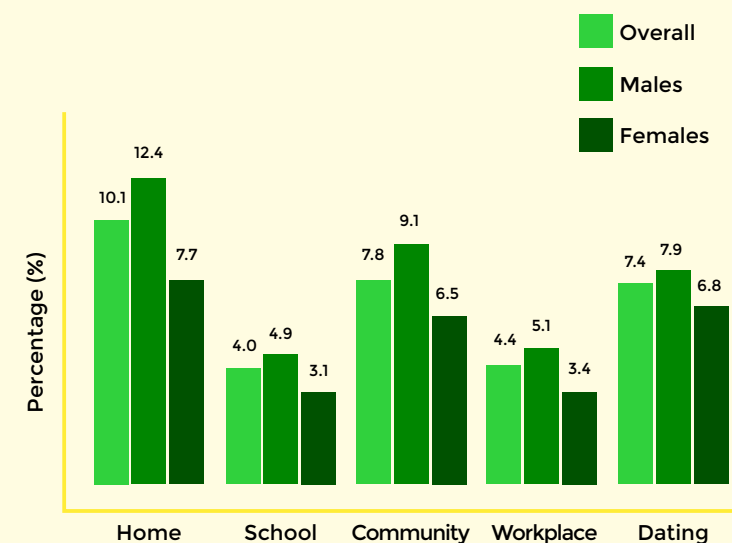


Figure 4. Prevalence of sexual abuse among children in the Philippines, by setting, as reported by 13-17 year olds

The NBS-VAC showed that **1 out of 5 Filipino children are sexually abused** and that **boys are more commonly abused than girls** (see Figure 3). The sexual abuse of children **usually occurs at home, in the community and during dating** (see Figure 4). On the other hand, sexually abused children seen in the WCPUs are more commonly female and are **typically 13-15 years old** (see WCPU statistics, page 22). Among the many forms of child abuse, child sexual abuse is the most difficult to detect since children rarely disclose that they have been sexually abused. The NBS-VAC showed that **only 2.7% of those who were sexually abused disclosed to anybody**. Majority of the disclosures were made to friends while 10-20% of disclosures were made to mothers. **Less than 1% reported to authorities**. Teachers and guidance counsellors were the professionals that most abused children disclosed to. However, there is significant evidence that **many professionals who are mandated to report abuse often fail to recognize maltreatment or report their suspicions**. In the WCPUs, few reports come from the school (see WCPU statistics, page 23).

KEY STRATEGY

Age-appropriate life skills and personal safety lessons integrated in the curriculums of public and private schools to develop children's and adolescents' skills in protecting themselves from violence, reporting, seeking help, and managing their own anger and impulsivity

CPN'S CONTRIBUTION

SAFE SCHOOLS FOR TEENS: PREVENTING SEXUAL ABUSE OF POOR URBAN TEENS

The Safe Schools for Teens project of the Child Protection Network Foundation, the country's Department of Education, University of the Philippines College of Education, Ateneo de Manila University's Bulatao Center for Psychology Services, University of Edinburgh, UBS Optimus Foundation, and Consuelo Foundation aims to increase disclosures of children and reporting by teachers of potential (or at-risk), suspected, and actual child sexual abuse cases. The first phase of the study includes training of teachers in the Recognition, Recording, Reporting, and Referral (4R's) of child abuse cases and training of School Child Protection Committees (CPCs) in responding to and managing cases of child abuse by students in the school. The second phase involves the delivery of student modules to Grade 7 and Grade 8 students to prevent sexual abuse among peers.

CPN'S CONTRIBUTION

MULTIDISCIPLINARY TRAINING ON THE PROTOCOL FOR CASE MANAGEMENT OF ABUSE, NEGLECT & EXPLOITATION

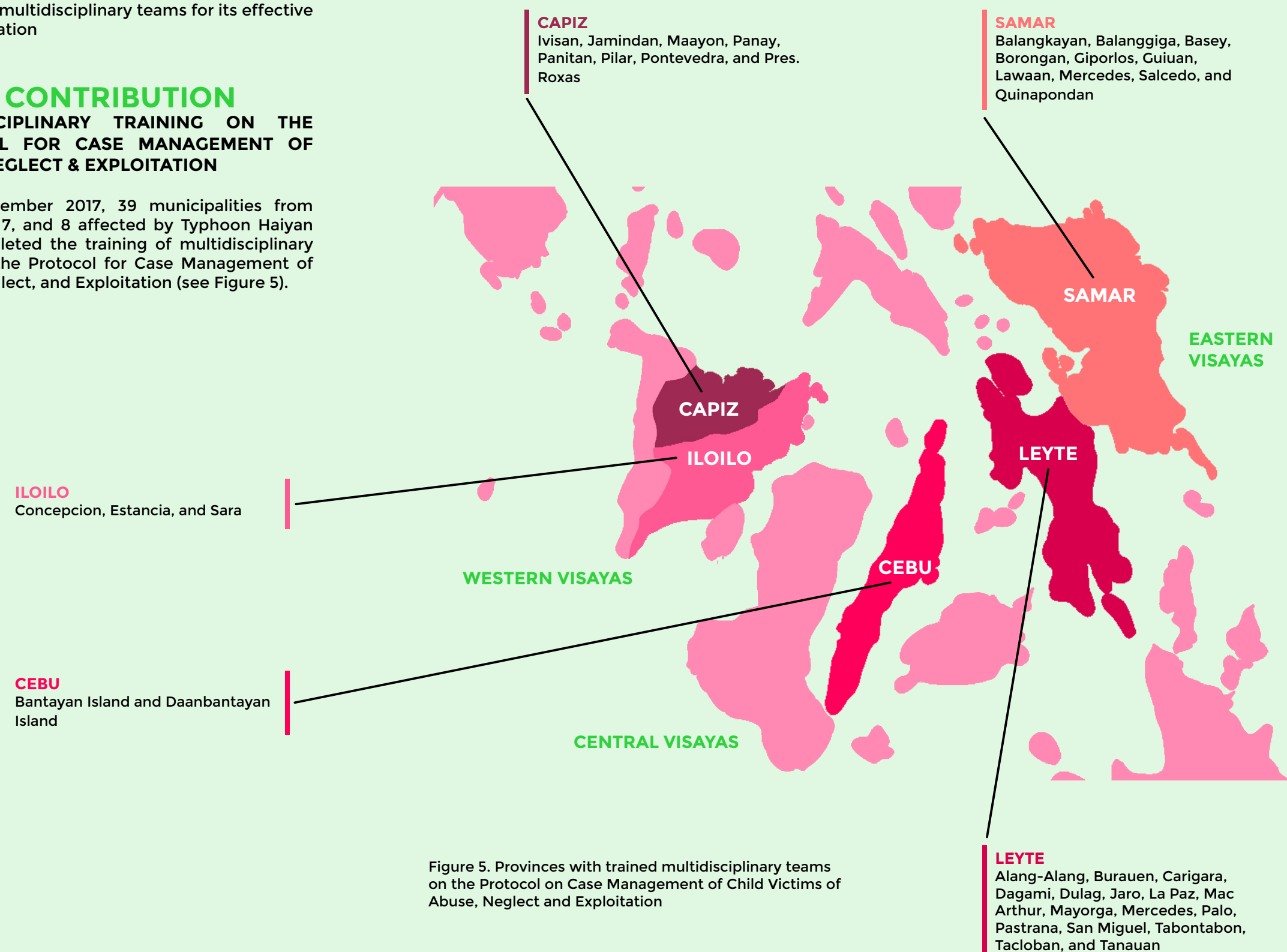


Figure 5. Provinces with trained multidisciplinary teams on the Protocol on Case Management of Child Victims of Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation

As of December 2017, 39 municipalities from Regions 6, 7, and 8 affected by Typhoon Haiyan have completed the training of multidisciplinary teams on the Protocol for Case Management of Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation (see Figure 5).

CPN’S CONTRIBUTION NATIONAL NETWORK OF WCPUS

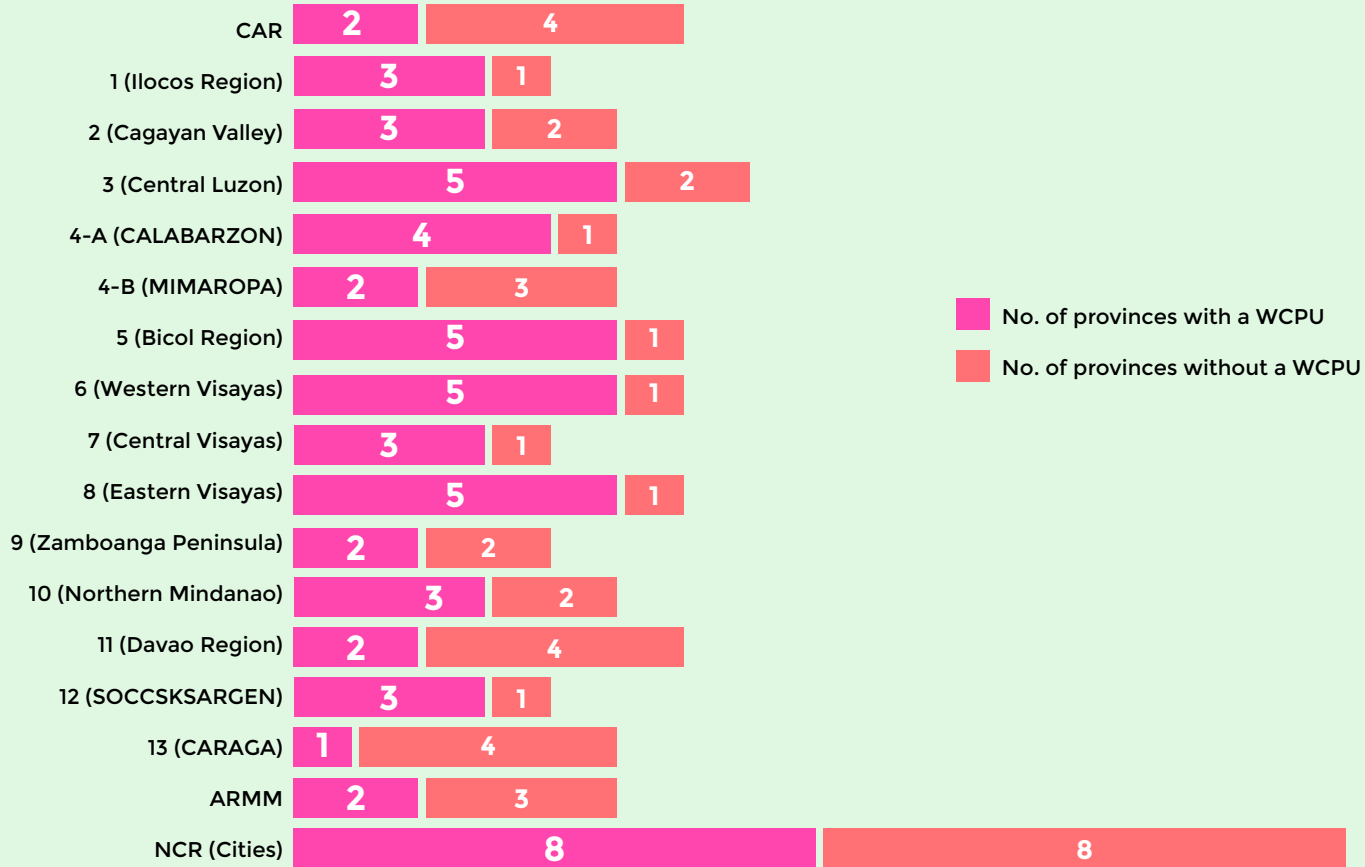


Figure 6. Proportion and number of provinces with and without a WCPU

As of December 2017, there is a total of 50 provinces with WCPUs that will serve as implementation arm of the VAC response plan (see Figure 6).

The WCPUs have provided comprehensive, multidisciplinary services to a total of 77,886 children and adolescents (see WCPU statistics, page 20).

NATIONAL CENTER FOR EDUCATION

The Child Protection Network functions as a national center for the training of multidisciplinary professionals who are at the frontline of responding to VAWC cases (see Table 1). CPN conducts the following trainings, among others:

- Multidisciplinary Team Training on Violence Against Women and Children (MDT on VAWC)
- Enhanced Training in Handling Abused Women and Children (EnTHAWC)
- Curriculum for Residency Training in Managing Victim-Survivors of Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) in coordination with the Task Force on Gender-based Violence, Committee on Reproductive Health, Philippine Obstetrical & Gynecological Society (Foundation), Inc., and supported by the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).
- Instructional Design Template on Child Protection Training in the Pediatric Residency Curriculum of the Philippine Pediatric Society (PPS) supported by UNFPA
- Trauma Informed Psychosocial Processing (TIPP)

CPN'S CONTRIBUTION

NATIONAL DATABASE ON CHILD ABUSE: THE WOMEN & CHILDREN PROTECTION MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM (WCPMIS)

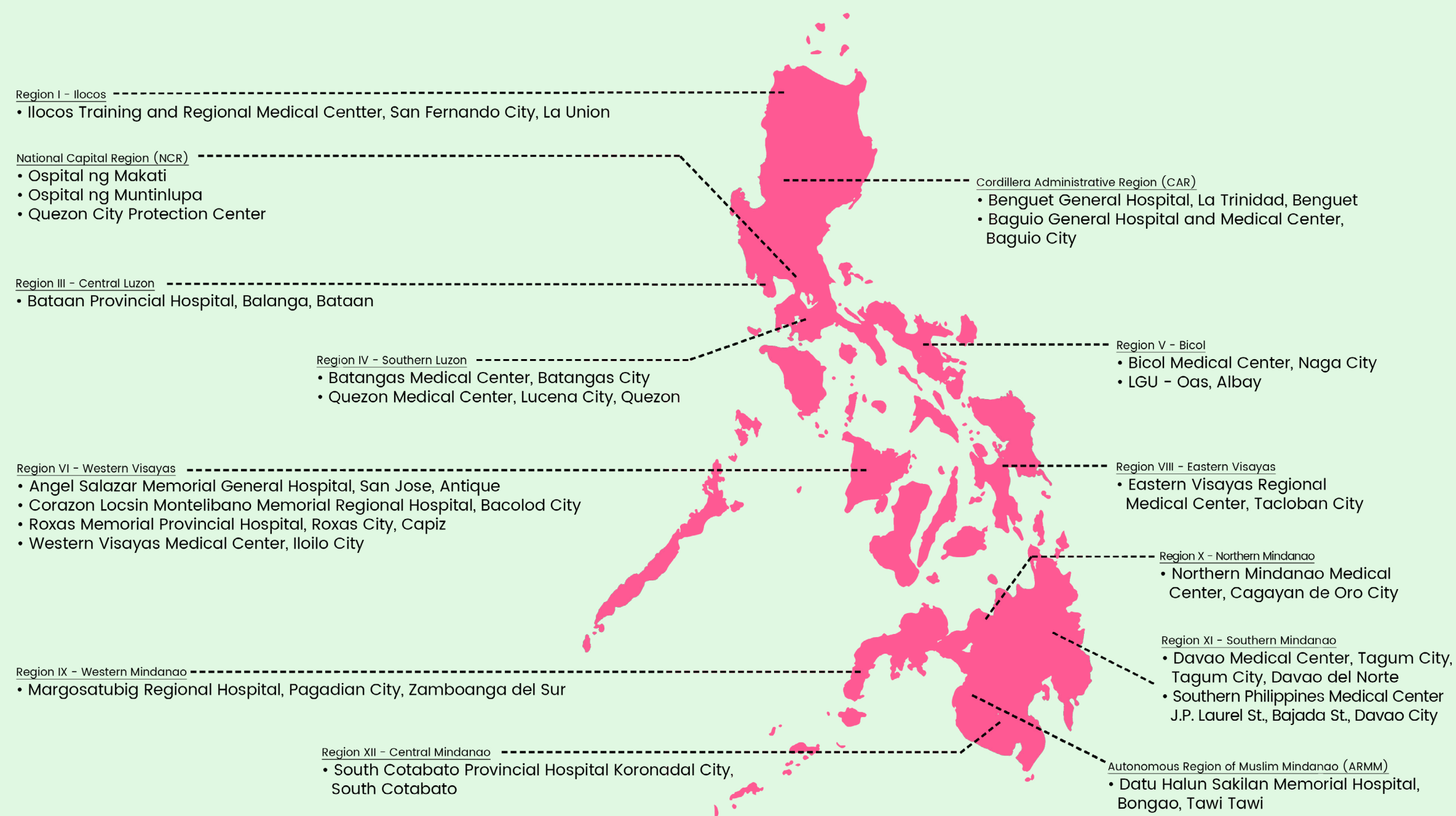


Figure 7. WCPUs utilizing the Women and Children Protection Management Information System

The WCPMIS has been installed in 22 WCPUs. Using this database system, the multidisciplinary team of WCPUs gauges the magnitude and impact of child abuse and neglect in its general clientele. The database system helps identify those who are at the highest risk and any emerging health concerns; monitor trends; properly allocate resources; and detect changes in professional practice (see Figure 7).

CPN'S CONTRIBUTION

THE EVALUATION OF WCPUs

In 2015, an evaluation of the Women and Children
Protection Units in the Philippines was completed
(see Table 2).

In general, out of 51 WCPUs visited for the study,
only five (5) can be considered non-functional
because of their inability to achieve at least 50%
of minimum standard criteria for organizational
structure and facility and 50% of care delivered
for designated level. It is however important to
emphasize that being designated non-functional
does not mean that a WCPU has totally ceased
operation. The fact is, all of them are open and
while limited, are ready and eager to provide
services to women and children survivors of abuse.

The Philippines has one of the youngest age of
statutory rape in the world at below 12 years of
age. In addition, the Philippine rape law does not
include boys as victims of rape. The reality is that
the most number of cases of sexual abuse seen by
the WCPUs are 13-15-year-old girls. The National
Baseline Study on Violence Against Children show
that more boys are sexually abused than girls but
they rarely report. The law needs to be amended
such that the age of statutory rape is increased to
less than 16 years old and boys should be included
as victims of rape.

CPN'S CONTRIBUTION

THE EVIDENCE FOR BETTER LIVES STUDY (EBLS)

The CANE Study Group under the Institute of Child Health and Human Development at the University of the Philippines Manila - National Institutes of Health is participating as a co-investigator in the EBLS, an integrated research, impact, and capacity-building programme involving eight medium-sized cities in low- and middle-income countries across the world. The study sites include Valenzuela City (Philippines), Kingston (Jamaica), Koforidua (Ghana), Stellenbosch (South Africa), Cluj-Napoca (Romania), Ragama (Sri Lanka), Tarlai Kalan (Pakistan), and Hue (Vietnam), with the research hub in Cambridge. The study aims to generate high-quality evidence on how to prevent violence against children and how to best support children growing up in the context of adversity so that they achieve their full potential. This is an example of a community of practice that demonstrates how research informs practice and policies on ending VAC.

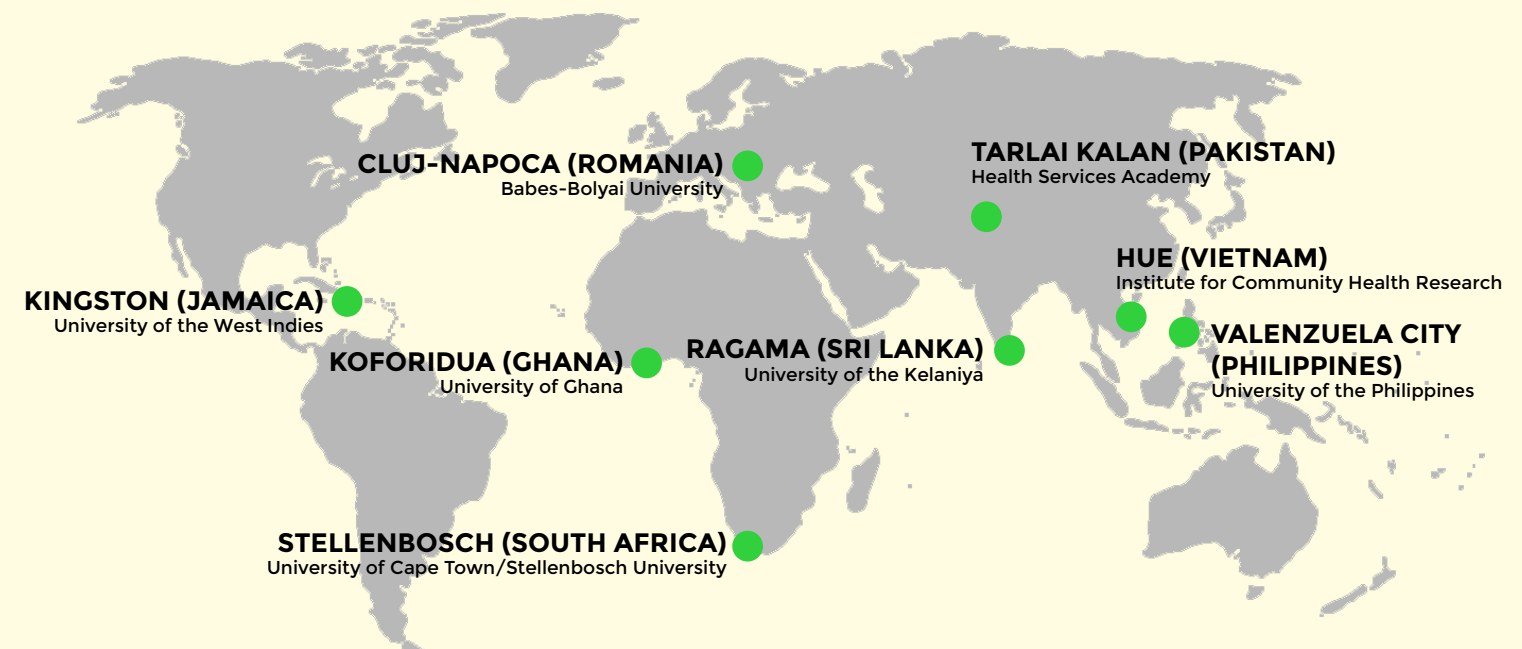


Figure 8. Location of the 8 Study Sites of the EBLS

AKO PARA SA BATA

THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE IN MANILA

Good parenting is the key to a happy, healthy, and productive adult. In fact, parenting has been identified as the single most important aspect in the prevention for child abuse and neglect. Thus, the 9th AKO PARA SA BATA The International Conference in Manila opened its doors to a wider audience by presenting “The Science and Art of Parenting Children Today” on November 30 to December 1, 2017 at SMX Convention Center Manila.

1,986 delegates learned about the underlying principles behind evidence-based effective parenting strategies presented by foreign and local experts doing research in this field. Frances Gardner from the University of Oxford discussed The Science of Parenting, Dr. Liane Alampay from ADMU presented Parenting 101, Sarah Norton-Staal from UNICEF talked about Parenting Support and Violence Prevention, Dr. Alexis Reyes from UP-PGH focused on Parenting Children with Disabilities, Dr. Honey Carandang from MLAC Institute tackled Parenting in OFW Families, Jamie Lachman from University of Oxford discussed Parenting 2-6, Dr. Stella Manalo of CPU-PGH and The Medical City gave a talk on Parenting the Digital Generation, and Judy Hutchings from Bangor University presented Online Parent Training. Pammy Godoy, the inspirational speaker, shared her experience in relationships and parenting.

The simultaneous sessions also covered different parenting situations such as Parenting Teens, Managing Behaviors in the Classroom, Parenting the Child with Autism, Parenting of Adopted Children and those in Foster Care, Research on Effectiveness of Parenting Interventions, Motherhood Under Difficult Circumstances, Parenting Young Children, Parenting Traumatized Children, and Issues in Parenting. Experts such as Samuel Girguis from the Azusa Pacific University, Dr. Carmen Bonoan from PAPA, Dr. Catherine Ward from University of Cape Town, Ysrael Diloy from Stairway Foundation, Atty. Bernadette Abejo from ICAB, Margaret Joan McLaren from PROkids, and Dr. Emma Alesna-Llanto from the UP-PGH Teen Mom Clinic are some of the speakers in the simultaneous sessions.

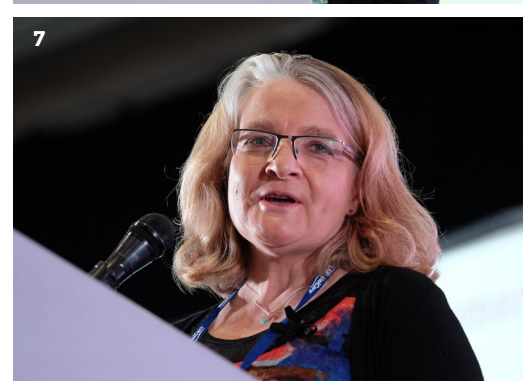
The Department of Health was awarded as CPN's Most Valuable Partner for 2017. The DOH has been CPN's partner from the beginning in the establishment of Women

and Children Protection Units (WCPUs) nationwide. There are now 94 WCPUs and Women and Children Protection Desks in 50 provinces and 9 cities in the Philippines. The proceeds of the AKO PARA SA BATA Conference assists in the realization of the Foundation's dream of having at least one WCPU in a government hospital in each province providing direct services to abused children and children-at-risk.

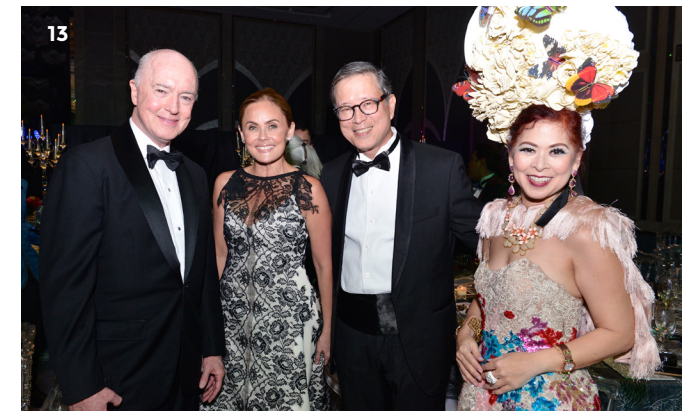

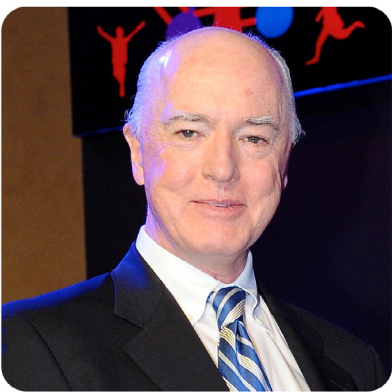

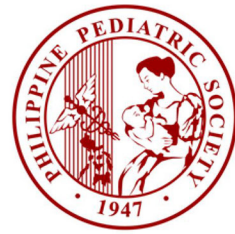
